

Census 2020: Why Should Philanthropy Care?



Guides foundation decision-making and strategy



\$700+ billion annually in federal funding to states and localities



Determines equal political representation

"Count everyone once, only once, and in the right place"



Internet as primary response option, addressing the digital divide



Reduce number of field staff, larger territories



Delayed communications plan

The Citizenship Question

Is this person a citizen of the United States? Yes, born in the United States Yes, born in Puerto Rico, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, or Northern Marianas Yes, born abroad of U.S. citizen parent or parents Yes, U.S. citizen by naturalization — Print year of naturalization No, not a U.S. citizen





The Problem

The Census Count is Not Equal Opportunity

Overcount

- Non-Hispanic Whites
 - Homeowners (proxy for higher income)
 - College students living away from home
 - Older people

Undercount (harder-to-count groups)

- People of color; American Indians on reservations
- Young children (ages 0-4)
- Renters (proxy for lower income)
- Immigrant/LEP households





Hard to Count Communities



Young children are the most likely to be undercounted

2.2 million children (0-4 years) were not counted. African American and Latino children were overlooked at **twice the rate** of white children.

Hard to count communities have been undercounted for decades, disadvantaging their families, communities, and neighborhoods.

1 in 3 Latinos live in hard-to-count census tracts

1 in 3 African Americans live in hard-to-count census tracts

1 in 4 Natives live in hard-to-count census tracts

1 in 5 Asian Americans live in hard-to-count census tracts










Massachusetts Plans for Census 2020



Massachusetts and the Census

- In 2010 Massachusetts faced numerous challenges regarding redistricting and was at risk of losing a legislative seat.
- It also faced the ramifications of fraudulent actions at the state legislative level resulting from unfair use of data.
- In FY 2015 Massachusetts received \$16 billion in census-led funding.

Medicaid is the largest federal program funded in Massachusetts at \$9 billion. Medicare, SNAP, and Section 8 are the other top-funded programs



Creation of Mass Census Equity Fund

Facing this reality we launched the Massachusetts Census Equity Fund with the following goals:

- Increase census response turnout by 5% in our Hard to Count communities.
- Increase the capacity of community organizations for civic engagement and community organizing.
- Foster funder collaborations on civic engagement and develop best practices in the area of census outreach.
- Document lessons learned from organizations involved in census activities.



What We Accomplished ...

- Collaboration of 12 funders, raised over \$1 million in about 6 months, awarded 30 grants across the state.
- Over half the communities where grantees worked increased their mail participation rates from 2000.
- 96% of organizations stated that participating in census outreach increased their capacity for civic engagement and community organizing.



What We Learned ...

- Reaching HTC communities requires creative strategies and dedicated on-the-ground staff and volunteers that represent the communities being reached.
- Appropriate language and cultural outreach strategies are essential to increasing participation of HTC communities.
- Funder and grantee initiatives are critical for statewide collaboration, particularly for rural and underserved communities.



What We Learned, continued ...

- Organizations and communities need more time to educate and inform their constituents about the importance of the census.
- Partnership is key: State, Census, Elected officials, grasstops and grassroots organizations ALL need to be in communication with one another as much as possible – and we can help make that happen.



What is at Stake for 2020?

- Billions of federal resources for key programs like Section 8,
 Medicaid and Child Nutrition programs
- Severe undercount of marginalized populations in the Commonwealth, leading to disenfranchisement and unrepresentative districts
- Incorrect data being used to for research and analysis, to understand our communities



Massachusetts Census Equity Fund 2020


- Develop critical partnerships to ensure that we reach targeted hard-to-count communities with resources and education.
 - Working directly with statewide civic engagement organizations
 - Meeting regularly with our Regional Census Staff
 - Collaborating with our Secretary of State's office
 - Tracking national news and Census related information
- Launch RFP January 2019 focus of building capacity at the grassroots level, across the state, for education and engagement in the 2020 census.
- Funders understanding that this is a long-term project, part of ongoing Civic Engagement and Empowerment work in the Commonwealth.
